

Don's Digest

Is it worth the effort?

On 4 July 1996 my boys and I took a trip which I had wanted to take for some

time. There is a 13.2 mile stretch of road in extreme southeastern Kansas which was known from 1926 to 1984 as part of "America's Main Street, Route 66." Not much preparation had taken place for this trip, in fact almost none. It was quite "spur of the moment." We quickly guessed how long it would take to drive and how long to explore. We announced to those concerned that we would be gone about 6 hours (I had added an hour to what the boys thought it would take). We had a good time and enjoyed each others company as well as exploring and photographing Route 66 in Oklahoma, Kansas and Missouri. We arrived home some 5 hours later than planned. Was it worth it? Sure! I don't think I want to take that trip again though, despite the fact we didn't do everything we wanted.

On Wednesday, 10 July 1996, my wife and I will celebrate 25 years of marriage. I have several things planned. I have purchased some silver jewelry to commemorate our Silver Anniversary. My son has designed T-shirts which my wife has no knowledge of and we will probably go out for dinner. We will top off the celebration later this year by taking a cruise. I would not want to go through the last 25 years again. Even the best of marriages have their ups and downs. Not to say that we didn't get along well but there is more to love and life than just living together. There are the jobs or lack there of, financial problems, child problems, family illness and the like. So was it worth the effort? Yes! And I look forward to the next 25 years.

I have started collecting music from the "Golden Age of Rock'n Roll'', 1955 - 1965. It became evident quite quickly that I would need to catalog my music to help eliminate duplication. This can't be done completely, but if you know what you have then you can make good decisions as to how to spend those hard-earned bucks. Some time after the song titles reached 500 in number, I realized that the word processor, while easy to use and familiar to me, was not the best way to go. Not having ever used Flex-File, I set out to convert my word processor file to a database file for I am not a great typist and didn't want to retype all that information. Since I started, my list has grown to over 800 titles. There have been many problems with the conversion. The instructions want you to waste time playing with an address book that I didn't want to mess with. I had trouble finding information on how to set up the database and to import files. I did, however, manage to make a database with the parameters I wanted and create a small file. This I converted to a word processor file and loaded into the word processor. Noting the format, I changed my word processor file to look like the sample. I then converted it and loaded it into the database, sort of. It seems that the transfer crashed every time I hit file #155. No explanation was given by the database except that "an error has occurred." It was for me to figure out where that was and why. Conversing with my computer friends was not much help. Someone remembered that there was some sort of problem

with 155 or 255 or something like that. Some thought the volume was too great for the database or the disk drive. My database has only 3 fields, so that is no problem. Each record is less than 100 characters long, so that is not a problem. I'm using a 1581 drive and allocating space for 2000 records, again, according to the instructions, no problem. The fact is that I could add to the file after the crash but would have to go into the file to be converted and separate the part already transfered from that which wasn't and try again. This was quite a hassle, jumping back and forth from database to word processor and back again. Finally, one night, I was determined to find the problem and get the job done. I broke the 500 records down into 6 files so as to help isolate the problem or if it was simply a size problem to eliminate it. The first file transfered completely with no problems as did the second. I was not so lucky with the third however. I studied the file closely checking every detail of the format. Nothing! Everything looked fine. Then it struck me like a lightning bolt! Could it be that there was some illegal character such as a dollar sign which it didn't like? Yes, there it was. Rinky Dink by Dave "Baby" Cortez. The word processor had no problem but the database did not like the quotation marks. Most people who use a computer call this a "double quote" while it is technically just a quote. The answer is to substitute the quote with an apostrophe or what is known by most computists as a "single quote." I wiped the slate clean once again and and try the transfer one more time. Success! All 6 files imported without a hitch. If all goes well, my son can scan the contents of the new CD's into his computer, use text recognition, convert to my format and save to an IBM disk. Next, I'll take it to the 128 and using the Big Blue Reader, convert to Commodore and load into Flex-File. Was it worth it? I don't know. We learn to crawl before we walk. I could have re-typed all the data in the time it took to figure out the problem but in the future, it should save much time. Even if it didn't, it is a whole lot more fun to sit and play than to just simply type in all that data. Or at least I'll keep telling myself that. Until next time, may your life see no data input errors.

Koala Pad to be Feature Demo

I have a confession to make: I love my Koala Pad. It's definitely one of the neatest peripheral devices ever made for the Commodore computer. If you've never seen one, the Koala Pad is a touch-sensitive drawing tablet. It has a 4-1/4 inch square drawing surface, and a pair of buttons at the top. The pad plugs into joystick control port 1 on the computer. "Drawing" on the surface with a stylus or even a fingertip produces a corresponding motion in the pointer on the screen. The effect is much like "drawing" with a mouse.

The Koala Pad included a cartridge-based paint program called KoalaPainter. Very nice results can be achieved with KoalaPainter although it can be jittery and lacks some features found in newer paint software. Flexidraw is another popular paint program that supports the Koala Pad. GEOS fans can use the pad with one of the drivers available in our Public Domain library.

I was visiting Robert Bales the first time that I got to see and operate a Koala Pad. I was hooked immediately. Robert was nice enough to loan it to me and, after a marathon series of late-night drawing sessions, I produced the nine cartoons that appeared on the second Disk O'Quarter. I reluctantly returned Robert's pad, but purchased one of my own at the first opportunity.

I'm sorry to say that Koala Pads are no longer being manufactured. Koala Technologies went out of business after producing two first-class products for the Commodore market: The Koala Pad and the Muppet Learning Keys. So, you'll have to turn to the used equipment marketplace for either of these items. The Koala Pad will be our featured demo at this month's club meeting. I'll try to keep the demo short so that other club members can give the pad a try for themselves. If you have a Koala Pad, bring it along so that we can give everyone a chance to work with one.


