
We can all be proud of stories like this. As we enter our fourth year promoting the "sharing, learning, and love of Commodore computers,"

At our last committee meeting, issues concerning advertising and the Public Domain library were discussed at length and I couldn't wait to report them to you.

Advertising has been hotly debated from the earliest days of our organization. The major hurdle that a low-budget operation like ours faces is the expense. Low-cost ads in Penny Power and the Eagle classified section have been tried with little to no measurable return on our investment. The latest idea is a cooperative effort between the CUW and Z-Software for an advertisement in the Southwestern Bell Yellow Pages. All of the details haven't been worked out, but the plan in general has received full support of the committee.

We have recognized for some time now, the need to better organize and update our Public Domain library. As a former librarian for the club, I can testify to the enormity of this

task. The real challenge, then, is how to get enough people involved so that one is not overwhelmed by the job. Don McManamey has proposed a solution that will make it possible for CUW members, for the first time ever, to take home parts of the library in exchange for reviewing the contents of those disks. We should be ready to implement this as early as next month.

Don's Digest

Claims about computers and software flow freely. One never knows what to believe. You must consider the source but that is not always a safe bet. Just

because someone is a trusted friend and well educated in computers does not mean they are giving reliable information. Recently I was told that I could save a lot of time making copies of the Disk O'Quarter if I used *Maverick* and a RAM expander (REU). This in spite my claim of speed using my fast load cartridge which has a copier built in. I decided to run a test to see which was best. Now one must understand that best is not confined to speed alone but this is one way of measuring value.

The comparison is of *Maverick's* one drive and REU fast copy, *Warp Speed's* two drive nibble copy and *Fast Hack'em's* two drive 35 second copy. The DOQ #14 side 1 was used as a master and copied to a fresh disk. I will make some personal notes afterwards but first the speed ratings.



Things to note are that *Maverick* is handicapped by having to load the master into the REU. Maverick does fully verify both the original and copy, Warp Speed performs only a write verify and Fast Hack'em does neither. Warp Speed allows you to view the directory of both the original and copy with one key stroke. Fast Hack'em allows viewing the directory of one disk or the other and the default is the source. Maverick does not allow you to view the directory afterwards without losing the master in the REU. All three give some indication as to disk errors with the most timely being Maverick. When making copies of the Disk O'Quarter all I really need to know is that the copy is good and I do like to view the directory of the copy from time to time. On occasion both Warp Speed and Fast Hack'em have crashed. At least I assume the problem was in the copy program. Warp Speed has the advantage of remaining a part of the computer and being available with one key stroke after a reset. In the case of a lock-up I need only reset the computer and I'm running again.

The times above do not show looking for the copy program disk but rather having the disk already in the machine as the fast load usually is. Keep in mind that I make 50 disks each quarter which is 100 disk sides. Speed is a major factor. The ability to copy the geoSide is a must but all three do this well. There is one advantage to using *Maverick*, wear and tear on the disk drives. If you only had one drive the REU would act as the other drive for the faster two drive copy but if you have two drives you need only run one. That's one less drive to have go out of alignment or whatever. Needless to say much of *Maverick's* advantage is lost if you are only making a very few copies. The long and the short is this, I will use *Maverick* for awhile to see if I truly like it better.

My tip and bit this month is double-check to make sure you have the right disk in your drive before you press the RETURN key.


